2 Course Description

This course explores the interaction between gender, language, and social structure. We will conduct critical investigation in the ways the production and perception of language reflects and perpetuates differences in gender identity and sexual orientation, and the potential in language to challenge and transform perceptions of gender and gender relations. We will also learn about how intersecting identities can further affect the relationship between gender and language. Both individual and social implications will be emphasized.

By the end of the course, students will have developed critical reading and reasoning skills when consuming social science articles. They also will be able to notice how language and gender interacts in their everyday life, and give a well-informed, critical analysis of their observations.

6 Participation

6.1 Discussion questions

- You are required to submit a discussion question for each day of class (but there are exceptions).
- Discussion questions are due by 9am on the day of class, on Sakai.
- You do NOT need to submit discussion questions on the day when you present in class.
- You do NOT need to submit discussion questions when we do not cover a research article in class.
- If we are scheduled to cover more than one article in class, you may choose the article to submit questions on.

6.2 Language observations

- You are required to come to class with a language observation every Monday.
- Language observations can be many different things: e.g. conversations you hear around you, debates on Facebook, advertisements, articles you read, something you notice on TV or in movies, etc.
- The observations must be about the interaction of language and gender.

7 Assignments

7.1 Presentations

- Each of you is required to present an article in class and lead the initial discussion.
- Presentations should at the least give a detailed summary of the article, and supplementary materials such as magazine articles, pictures, memes, blogposts, and videos are encouraged.
- The student should prepare discussion questions as part of leading the initial discussion.
- There is no strict time or format requirement, but generally the presentation should take about 20 minutes.

7.2 Short papers

- There will be three short papers (500-word) assignments throughout the semester.
- Prompts might ask you to investigate an aspect of everyday life, or critically evaluate a claim about language and gender.

8 Midterm exam

- The midterm exam will be take-home where you critically evaluate an article on language and gender in 3-4 pages, double-spaced.
- You will have two weeks to complete the exam.

9 Final project

- Your will conduct a simple project, investigating an aspect of language and gender. Examples
 of topics include polling friends and family about their opinion on gendered speech, analyzing
 a TV-show on how it displays gender differences in dialogues, gender differences in the use of
 adjectives in children's books, etc.
- \bullet You must submit your final project proposals for approval by 04/10. The proposal should contain the followings:
 - The question that you are answering, and how it is connected to the course material.
 - Your plan for tackling the question (methods of data collection and analysis)
 - Preliminary literature research including at least three sources.
- You will give a 12-minute presentation on your project in the end of the semester, and write a 4-6 page, double-spaced final paper on your findings.
